

Navigating the Bible	Appendix: Questions
During this term, we will be reading from the Bible a fair amount, so it will be important to know how to navigate it.	
Contents Page: In every Bible there is a contents page which tells you where each book of the Bible is located. This is usually found a couple pages before the first book of the Bible, 'Genesis'.	
Testaments: The Bible has two testaments. The Old Testament (the first 3/4) and the New Testament (the last 1/4).	
Books: The Bible consists of 66 books. The main book we will be looking at this term is Mark, but we will also be looking through other books to see how they relate. Some books like 1 Peter start with numbers to differentiate between books with the same title. E.g. Genesis 2:7	
Chapters: Each book is broken up into chapters. These are the large numbers. Some books have 1, others have over 50. These are usually used to break big idea's up. E.g. Genesis <u>2</u> :7	
Verses: Within each chapter, there are little numbers (superscript) called verses. These are used to find specific sentences or paragraphs. E.g. Genesis 2:7

This term we will be looking at the basic life of Jesus, who he was, what he taught and what he did.

Discussion: C.S. Lewis argued that based on what the Bible says Jesus did he could only be one of three things. He's either a Lunatic, a Liar or Lord. Which one of these do you believe Jesus is?

This term, we will be spending most of our time in the book of Mark, where we will follow Jesus' life and understand the basics of what Christians believe.

Week 2: What is the Bible?

Week 6: How does the Resurrection relate to Life?

Week 3: What is Sin?

The Bible never explicitly defines sin (i.e. it never says "sin is..."). This is because 'sin' wasn't a complicated word when the Bible was written. So, to work out what 'sin' is we need to do a bit of digging.
