Introduction to this section

Chapters 2-4 are filled with what can be thought of as new beginnings. We can summarise the ones we find here in the following diagram: [note for Mr Kilgore, this is NOT a table ;)]











How does the purpose of the Gospel (20:31) help us understand these new beginnings?



2:1-22 ... What is new replaces what is old

(2:1-11) Water into wine (the first sign)

What are some interesting things about verse 11?

What is the 'new v. old' in this section?

(2:12-22) New Temple

What is the problem with the request in 2:18? Or, why does 'proof' not lead to a saving faith?

What is the link between 1:14 & 2:19?

2:23 - 3:21 ... From above - new birth

STRUCTURE

(2:23 - 3:15) Jesus & Nicodemus (3:16-21) John adds further explanation (3:22-30) John the Baptist speaks about Jesus (3:31-36) John adds further explanation

(2:23 - 3:15) Jesus & Nicodemus

Why are we told that Nicodemus came to Jesus at night?



(3:16-21) John adds further explanation

What contrasts are being made in this section?

(3:22-30) John the Baptist speaks about Jesus

What John says:

- (v. 27) I have done what God gave me to do.
- (vv. 28-29) I was sent to prepare the way for the Christ; job done.
- (v. 30) Time for me to fade and for him to do what he came to do.

(3:31-36) John adds further explanation

The explanation culminates in verse 36 (you probably won't find the whole verse cross-stitched onto a pillow!):

Whoever believes in the Son, this one has eternal life, but whoever rejects the Son will not see life, but the wrath of God remains on that one. (GBHV)

4:1-42 ... Living water - the Saviour of the world

The 'new' now introduced is Jesus as living water:

- Replacing Jacob's well
- Replacing the place to truly worship God
- Changing the place of Jesus' ministry now coming to the world
- Changing the lives of people.

(4:1-9) Jesus 'had to' go through Samaria

List the radical things Jesus does just in these introductory verses.



(4:10-30, 39-42) Living water

In this section, the Samaritan woman learns of new things:

- (23) new worship
- (25-26) new **Messiah**
- (29) new forgiveness
- (42) new salvation.

What else becomes 'new' for this woman?

Comparing this interaction with Jesus' interaction with Nicodemus, what are the similarities? But what is an important difference?

If there was an opportunity to delve deeper (worthwhile if time permits) we could ask how the following passages are fulfilled in the living water that Jesus gives:

 Psalm 36:7-9
 Psalm 42:2
 Psalm 63:1
 Psalm 143:6

 Isaiah 12:3
 Isaiah 12:3
 Isaiah 55:1-5

 Jeremiah 2:13
 Ezekiel 47:1-12
 Zechariah 14:8

After hearing Jesus for themselves, the conclusion of the Samaritan people about Jesus was:

Jew Prophet Messiah Saviour of the World

How does this reflect the common movements we see in the Gospel of John?



(4:31-38) A new perspective for the disciples

What Jesus teaches his disciples about the significance of what is happening:

- (34) Jesus is doing what he was sent to do
- (35) the harvest is ready; people are responding to Jesus = end time
- (36-38) those who sow and those who reap rejoice together.

4:43-54 ... Jesus brings life in the place of death

The journey towards Galilee that Jesus began in verse 4 continues (v. 42) and he reaches his destination (v. 45), knowing that he would, in the end, find 'no honour' from the people there (v. 43), even though they had **seen for themselves** all that he had been doing (v. 45).

Once back in Cana (where the **first sign** took place) Jesus performed his **second sign** in the healing of the child of the royal official.

In what ways can 'signs' be both good and bad things? (See 4:40 & 2:11)


In what way can Jesus' **words** and **works** function together to bring **belief**?




At the end of these chapters, what is the question that the writer (John) wants us readers to answer? And what consequences does our answer have?


