# What makes for effective gathering leading?

The **Church Gathering Leader** is the person responsible for leading a (Sunday) church gathering (or 'service').

The important role of the Gathering Leader is to set the appropriate tone and to help those present to engage with what is being taught from the Bible.

We want Jesus to be honoured, valued, and thanked in the gathering. Your role therefore, is **to point people to Jesus**.

You will need to think through some key questions...

- What does "good" like?
- How will I do this for the start, middle and end of the gathering?

# 7 Tips for Gathering leading

- 1. Pray. Please make sure you talk to God as you prepare for this role.
- 2. **Be prepared**. Set the running plan or order early (or by the deadline) and get it to those who will be playing a role in the gathering this helps everyone to prepare well and keeps everyone on the same page.
  - Read and be aware of the Bible passage that is to be preached on.
  - From the preacher, be aware of the "big idea" or major theme that is being preached on.
  - Be aware of the themes (and if possible, the words) of the songs for the gathering.
- 3. Let your **personality** shine through. Be you, be real, be creative. Let it be known that you are excited to be there.
- 4. Throughout use the term 'Gathering' (rather than 'Service') as Christians are called to gather. Church is not a service put on for the sake of those who come. Church is a gathering of believers who meet around the Word of God.

- **5.** Put effort and thought into **introductory and linking sentences** which help connect the different elements of the gathering, that is...
- i. Drawing Together
- ii. Hearing the Word
- iii. Responding to the Word
- iv. Sending out to serve
- **6. Watch the time**. Start on time. Manage the time even if it means shortening or cutting things (apart from the Bible reading and Preaching) in order to finish on or before the scheduled time.
- 7. Be mindful of the outsider (visitor or unbeliever) acknowledge and welcome them to reinforce their legitimate place in the gathering, (but DO NOT point them out or draw attention to them!) This indirectly helps the committed members of your church to know this is a place where visitors are welcome. Remove insider jokes. Try to remove or explain any jargon. Use first and last names.

That said, a Church gathering is the meeting place for a church family, so there are necessary things members will need to talk about so don't overdo the 'seeker sensitive' emphasis even though we want outsiders to join us in what we do.

In summary, a good principle is bear in mind is: Make your first words and your last words in the gathering to be about God.

### Putting it together

#### **Pre-Gathering Prayer**

As one of the purposes of a church gathering is to talk to people about God, it is helpful to first talk to God about people! Therefore, it is important for you to **lead all who are to be involved in the gathering in prayer** prior to the scheduled start time.

#### The Welcome

The 'welcome' should aim to **orientate people to what will follow**. It can be after a song (or two), or it can be the formal start of the gathering.

There are a few different ways to welcome... (try to avoid reading your welcoming comments)

- 1. The Self intro (e.g. Welcome, I am...)
- 2. The Vertical intro (e.g. a verse or prayer)
- 3. The Orientation intro (e.g. why we gather and what the gathering will look like, what people might need)
- 4. The Expectation intro (e.g. what to expect, a teaser, a question especially around the theme of the Bible passage/sermon)

Let people know where things are, for example, toilets, cry room, pick up a Bible, any handouts that might be necessary.

# Putting it together

#### **During the Gathering**

Be aware of the "vibe" throughout the gathering and if and when a brief reflective comment or pause or prayer might be helpful.

Be aware of practical steps you can take to **link the parts of the** gathering together which highlight themes and point people to Jesus.

#### The Close

It is helpful to capture a personal aspect of the gathering in the way that you close. This can look like...

- 1. Pray in response to what has been said
- 2. Refer (briefly) to the Bible passage or a point made in the sermon
- 3. Provide a question for people to discuss over morning tea/supper
- 4. Suggest an application for people to adopt in the next couple of days
- 5. Encourage people to talk to someone they don't know
- 6. Mention the passage for the following week at Church

Your conclusion does not need to be heavy (there is no need to repreach the sermon), or a profound statement. **Keep it short and simple** (e.g. after a big night, 'It's now Supper time' can be helpful).

# Putting it together

### Front of House - Other important stuff to know!

As the Gathering Leader you are responsible to ensure that the 'front of house' elements are in place – that is anything that occurs from the platform (or on the screen).

Please **be present at least half an hour before** the gathering is scheduled to start to check that all is in place. This should include:

- the lectern is where you want it (it does not need to be in the centre)
- your microphone works (and suits your purpose often there are microphone choices: headset mic, remote handheld mic, or lectern mic) – and that you have the microphones you need for others (i.e. for an interview, Bible readers etc.)
- Check are Bible Reader/s, Prayer/s, Interviewee/s, Musicians etc. ready?
- Check the visuals to be used in the Gathering (that they are what you expect and in the order you want them)
- Check the space in which you are meeting. Is it "welcoming", neat, tidy, and free of clutter, with no rubbish lying around? Are the lights on? Fans? Air-conditioning? Heating? Cooling? Is the cry room/creche neat and tidy? Are the toilets welcoming?

# Gathering as Anglicans

### Principles from the Book of Common Prayer

#### • Ceremonies Should Serve a Purpose

- o Traditions and ceremonies should enhance understanding and edification, not obscure the gospel.
- They should help people remember their duty to God and promote godly discipline.

#### Avoid Superstition and Empty Rituals

- Some traditions may begin with good intent but can become superstitious or burdensome over time
- Leaders should be willing to remove practices that mislead or burden people's consciences.

#### • Order and Discipline Are Necessary

- Church gatherings require some structure to maintain order and avoid chaos.
- A balance is needed between avoiding excessive ritual and ensuring services are conducted in a seemly and edifying manner.

#### • Guard Against Legalism and Innovation for Its Own Sake

- The gospel is not a ceremonial law; Christian worship should reflect the freedom of the Spirit, not bondage to rigid rituals.
- Avoid both extreme traditionalism (clinging to ceremonies for their own sake) and constant innovation (rejecting traditions simply because they are old).

#### • Ceremonies Should Be Understandable

- Church practices should not be obscure or confusing; they should clearly point to Christ and the gospel.
- Leaders should ensure that all elements of a service—prayers, readings, and sacraments—are accessible and meaningful to the congregation.

#### Adaptation for the Sake of the Gospel


- Churches should remove ceremonies that become stumbling blocks but retain those that promote reverence and faithfulness.
- o Different church communities may adopt different practices as long as they serve God's glory and do not lead people into error or superstition.

#### • Church Leaders Must Act with Authority and Wisdom

- No individual should arbitrarily introduce or remove church practices without proper authority.
- Changes should be made thoughtfully, with the goal of preserving unity and helping people grow in godliness.

### GOSPEL GATHERINGS How-to-Guide

A Gospel Gathering PREPARES us to HEAR God's Word, RESPOND to it, and sends us to GO into God's World.



A Gospel Gathering takes us from the GLORY OF GOD through the GRAVITY OF SIN to the GRANDEUR OF GRACE and a LIFE OF SERVICE

Rather than just asking 'where does this element go?', the Gospel Gatherings Framework shows how each practice can point us to the glory of God, gravity of sin, grandeur of grace, and help us prepare, hear and respond to the word of God.

When planning a church gathering we must ask of everything we are doing - is this preparing us to hear God's word, hearing God's word, responding to God's word, or going into his world?

Everything in the gathering must be done as preparing to hear God's word, hearing God's word, or responding to God's word. It places God's word at the centre, but also ensures proper preparation and response to God's word.

Each gospel practice contributes to the overall symphony. As a gathering leader you are a songwriter and conductor, putting together a gathering with rhythm that leads people through the gospel and interaction with and response to God's word, and then guiding people through that gathering.

- We prepare to hear God's word as we draw together under God and his Glory
- We hear God's word being challenged by the gravity of sin and goodness of God
- We respond to God's Word and lead people to the throne of Grace
- We go into God's word as we live and serve for him

The congregation comes to church with a variety of emotions from the depths of despair to the height of delight. Starting meetings with the **Glory of God** provides a deep understanding of the wonder of God's character and is the **only way** for all of the congregation to interpret the varying emotions they bring to church. **Focusing on God's Glory draws the whole congregation together as one church before God.**

### **HEARING God's Word** How am I going to help people HEAR God's Word? If there is an Old Testament reading that is not explained in the sermon, can you respond to that reading - and give it a clearer place in the gathering - by singing in response afterwards? le, if it is an Old Testament judgment passage, link it to a song afterwards about God's holiness as righteous judge. The framework reminds us to conclude on **grace**. Rather than simply stirring people to try harder we are intentionally **leading people each week to the throne of Grace**. If the sermon doesn't land there then the gathering leader should consider how to get there with song/s and prayer. We never want to end with the idea of people having to try really hard to please God.
